CALVERT HALL NAMES NEW PRESIDENT

Brother Dennis Malloy, FSC, Provincial of the Baltimore District has accepted the unanimous recommendation of an ad hoc committee of the Board of Trustees, and has appointed Brother Thomas Zoppo, FSC, as the fourth president of Calvert Hall, effective July 1, 2009.

Brother Thomas, 51, has been principal of Christian Brothers Academy in Syracuse, NY since 2003. Prior to that he was director of curriculum and instruction at De La Salle High School, Concord, CA, academic advisor and lecturer at Manhattan College, NY, vice principal for student affairs at La Salle Institute, Troy, NY, and teacher of religion and mathematics at St. Raymond High School, Bronx, NY and at La Salle Academy, Manhattan, NY.

Brother Thomas holds a B.S. in business administration from Villanova University and an M.S. in school administration from Manhattan College. He has also pursued graduate studies in counseling, spirituality and school leadership at Manhattan College, Notre Dame University and Boston College.

Calvert Hall will officially welcome Brother Thomas at the May 7th meeting of the Board of Trustees and at a faculty reception the following day. He succeeds Brother Benedict Oliver, FSC, who has served as president of Calvert Hall since 2005. Brother Benedict will be returning to Central Catholic High School in Pittsburgh to direct the school's writing center and assist with its alumni and development programs.

BROTHER ALBERT SCHMIDT CELEBRATES 70TH ANNIVERSARY

Young Albert Schmidt grew up in Holy Rosary Parish in the Homewood section of Pittsburgh. The parish had just built a beautifully ornate church that became the centerpiece of the east end of the city. From there his education continued at the Norman Gothic school building on Fifth Avenue known as Central District Catholic High. In 1938 he entered the Christian Brothers novitiate in Ammendale, where he received the robe and the name Brother Dagobert Martin. Although he earned a BA in English as an undergraduate at Catholic University and La Salle College, it was not long before he also studied for a Masters degree in mathematics at the University of Pittsburgh. He subsequently taught religion and math at West Catholic, St. John's, Central Catholic, Hudson Catholic, Bishop Walsh and Archbishop Carroll.

But Brother Albert's early strong interest in art and design later led him to pursue a program in art at the University of Notre Dame, receiving a Masters degree in 1960. The devoted artist spent many hours carving and painting at the garage worktable, bringing forth works that included statues of St. La Salle, St. Therese, and a striking sculpture depicting St. La Salle in company with Brothers Mutien Marie, Miguel and Solomon. His artwork can also be found in many of his previous communities.

After 47 years of teaching Brother Albert retired from the classroom in 1990. Due to health issues he took up residence at La Salle Hall, Ammendale, in 1993 and, in 2007, moved to De La Salle Hall in Lincroft, NJ. It was there on October 30th that the Brothers gathered to celebrate Brother Al's 70th anniversary as a member of our brotherhood. After renewing his vows at morning prayer, he was joined at lunch by the members of the District administration, as well as a group of Brothers from Ammendale and St. Gabriel's Hall. Amid festive decorations, a smiling Brother Albert accepted the compliments and good wishes of Brother Michael Finnegan, the community Director, and Brother Dennis Malloy, Provincial. Brother Dennis applauded his contributions as a gifted math teacher and artist, and expressed the special gratitude of the community for his fraternal loyalty and generosity.

District Educators Participate In Rome Conference

Shortly after Vatican Council II, the Christian Brothers developed a specialized renewal program that focused on continuing formation for Brothers in light of Lasallian scholarship, the renewal of religious life and the emerging needs of the Brothers' educational mission. Over the years lay partners have been invited to join in part of the program to assist in the development of our Shared Mission.

This year's theme, Brothers and Lasallians: The Word, the Mission and the Ministers, coincided with the conclusion of the Synod of Bishops that focused on the Word of God in the life of the Church. Since October, Brother Robert Schaefer,

FSC, of Central Catholic High School in Pittsburgh, along with 32 other Brothers from 20 countries have been studying and reflecting on the teaching of the Synod and how it relates to our mission of Catholic educational service to the poor. During the month of February, Mr. Jeffrey Mancabelli, Principal of St. John's College High School in Washington, joined 31 other lay partners from throughout the international Institute at the sessions to add to the depth of discussion about the needs and challenges facing Lasallian schools worldwide. Brother Robert reports that the shared dialogue was a very enriching experience for the participants.

Students Explore Religious Life

A Discovery Retreat for young men in high school who are considering the Christian Brothers as a possible vocation was held in Pittsburgh, PA in late January. Five young men from Central Catholic High School and one from De La Salle Oaklands in Toronto gathered at La Roche College for the three day retreat. Daily activities consisted of prayer and reflection, input from various brothers, and an experience at an inner city Catholic grade school. Speakers included Brother Edward Hofmann, Vocation Director for the Baltimore Province, and Central Catholic teachers, Brothers Robert Peach and Peter Nguyen, each of whom spoke on their vocation stories. Brother Timothy Dean, Lasallian Animator for the St. Gabriel's Hall System in Philadelphia, gave an excellent conference on the challenges that St. John Baptist de La Salle faced in founding and guiding the Brothers of the Christian Schools during his life. The retreat concluded with an invitation to the young men to consider the Aspirancy Program, which would allow them the opportunity to continue to explore the life and work of the Brothers as they move on to college. In this program a candidate would meet with a Brother periodically for discussion and guidance, and also have a chance to visit our communities and attend gatherings with other aspirants during the year.

A Loving REMEMBRANCE



Brother Lewis Mullin, F&C
 Brother Lewis died in his 81st year on October 19, 2008 at Holy Cross Nursing Home. Brother Lewis entered the Brothers after his graduation from West Catholic in 1945. After earning his undergraduate degree at The Catholic University he subsequently received a Masters Degree from Temple University. In the course of his 63 years as a Christian Brother he served at St. John's, La Salle-Immaculata, Central Catholic, La Salle High, La Salle University, Hudson Catholic, and Archbishop Carroll. In his homily, his classmate, Brother Edward Gallagher, recalled that Brother Lewis had an abiding love for Holy Scripture, especially for the writings of St. John. As a result of his studies in this area he became associated with Father Raymond Brown, SS, the renowned scripture scholar. For several summers he hosted the Brown Symposium at La Salle University. It was also noted that as a teacher and guidance counselor Brother Lewis took great interest in his students, especially with those who might be struggling in their schoolwork or with personal problems, and that in doing so he reflected those qualities of a good shepherd which St. La Salle said should be characteristic of a Brother. Poor health necessitated Brother Lewis' retirement in 1993, after which he resided at La Salle University and La Salle Hall, Ammendale.

 Brother Michael died in his 96th year on November 3, 2008 at De La Salle Hall, Lincroft, NJ. A native of Johnstown, PA, Brother Michael was the oldest Brother in the United States at the time of his death. During his 78 years as a Brother he served at West Catholic, St. John's and St. Francis Vocational School, but the majority of his active years were spent in District service at Ammendale (29 years) and on the staff of Central Catholic High School (23 years). For many summers he was very popular among the children who attended Camp Ammendale. He would eventually retire on that same property in 1993. Even after declining health necessitated a transfer to our infirmary in New Jersey in 2004, Brother Michael's ready smile and good nature had a positive impact on the life of the De La Salle Hall Community. At the funeral service Brother Kevin Erb recalled that Brother Michael was always attentive to the care of the more infirm members of the community, and that he would also play the piano at nursing homes in the area in an effort to uplift the spirits of the residents.

 Brother William died in his 76th year at the Vincentian Fathers' Infirmary on January 21, 2009. Brother William entered the Brothers Novitiate after his graduation from La Salle High School in 1950. After receiving a BA from La Salle University he embarked on 55 years of educational service that included assignments at our child care institutions (St. Francis Vocational School, St. Gabriel's Hall), high schools (La Salle, St. John's, Archbishop Carroll), La Salle University, and at the Christian Brothers National Office. In his early years he also earned a Masters in Theology at La Salle University and a Doctorate in Education from Temple University. As Brother Arthur Bangs observed at the funeral Mass, Brother Bill had a great love of history and a flair for writing. The Brothers are particularly indebted to him for an article entitled, "A Century of Service ~ The Life of Brother Erminus Joseph," the legendary Director of Novices in the Baltimore District. Brother Bill's final illness lasted just two months, during which time, as Brother Arthur recalled, "we witnessed a wonderful resignation to God's will and a marvelous equanimity of spirit ~ his last testimony for all of us to learn."

Grant them eternal rest, Lord.

The spiritual life of the Brothers in residence at the Baltimore District's main retirement home in "Ammendale" Maryland, is greatly enriched by the faithful service of several priests. Brother John McErlean, FSC, Director of the community, expresses their appreciation: "We are truly blessed to celebrate Mass in community several times a week in addition to our weekend liturgy. Our chaplains support and enhance our common life by the generous gift of their priesthood and personalities."

Bishop Joseph McFadden, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Philadelphia, has graciously presided at the annual blessing of the Brothers' graves on Holy Souls Day, after which he has celebrated a memorial Mass for the Brothers and the deceased members of the St. La Salle Auxiliary. A graduate of St. Thomas More HS, Bishop McFadden has been a close friend of the Brothers since his days as a Religion teacher and basketball coach at West Catholic before entering the seminary.

Father Brian Fox, SSJ, is Rector of the Josephite Fathers Seminary in Washington, DC. In addition to a missionary assignment in Nigeria, the native New Yorker has also served his community in Texas and Alabama.

Father Richard Hilgartner is a graduate of Calvert Hall and a priest of the Archdiocese of Baltimore. He is currently Associate Director for the Secretariate for the Liturgy with the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops in Washington, DC. He had previously been the chaplain at Mt. Saint Mary's College.

Father Howard Johnson, a priest of the Diocese of Jackson, MS, is a retired U.S. Army chaplain. He has been associated with the Ammendale community for many years and is currently in residence at St. Joseph's Seminary in Washington.

Father Daniel Kutys, was Director of Religious Education for the Archdiocese of Philadelphia before assuming his current post as Executive Director of the Office for the Catechism with the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops in Washington, DC. He is a graduate of Cardinal O'Hara HS.

Father Jack O'Hara, a priest of the Diocese of Arlington (VA), currently serves as Associate Pastor of St. Charles Borromeo Parish in Arlington. A graduate of Bishop O'Connell HS, his priestly ministry has also included several years of service in the Dominican Republic.

Father Rocco Puopolo, SX, is a member of the Xaverian Missionaries and is currently the Executive Director of the African Faith & Justice Network in Washington, DC. A native of Massachusetts, he served his community for many years in Sierra Leone, West Africa.

NO ROOM IN THE "INN"

Though you will be reading this article early in 2009, I am sitting down at what passes for a typewriter in this technological age on December 26th, Boxing Day in Canada, where for a time I hung my hat, and throughout what used to be referred to as the British Empire. I say this only to put my commentary in the context of the Christmas Season, a time of great hope commemorating God's gift of Himself through the miracle of the Nativity. You all know St. Luke's accounting very well, especially the drama of the birth of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ in the stable at Bethlehem because there was no room in the inn.

Well during this frightful year just ending, the Christian Brothers have come to a similar place and concluded that we have run out of room at our "inn", the retirement community and residence at La Salle Hall, Ammendale, located at Beltsville, Maryland.

This facility, designed for independent living but transformed as planned over the years to an assisted as needed living environment complete with nursing and other assistance, replaced its entirely inadequate predecessor and opened its doors in October, 1994. It has been a great blessing to our Senior Brothers, but now the twenty-two bedroom "inn" is full. Like all religious institutes, our average age has increased by nearly the same number of years that have intervened. And, the Brothers preferred policy of "retirement in place" is more and



more challenged by community houses at most apostolates, some of which we don't "own", and which are not 'senior friendly'. Those who monitor the norms of the Americans With Disabilities Act would not be pleased to find some of our most venerable confreres, the Senior Brothers, coping as best they can in such environments. They deserve and need better. So, in this year 2009 we plan to increase the capacity at La Salle Hall by the construction of a new addition.

We'll have more to say about the addition in the next edition, but first a little history. When the high school preparatory community or Juniorate was closed and the Novitiate was moved to Pittsburgh in the mid 1960s, the retired Brothers (then known lovingly and universally throughout the Institute as the "Holy Family Community", another Christmas connection) were left by themselves in the immense Novitiate Building constructed in the 1880s. Maintenance of such a large and nearly empty building for this community was impractical and they were moved across the road into the 1920s era Juniorate Building, the original La Salle Hall at Ammendale.

Because of the haste of this move only minimal renovations were made to the Juniorate. A kitchen was constructed in the physics laboratory and a dining room in the chem lab. The two dormitories were converted to less than adequate private bedrooms with paper thin walls and without en suite facilities; even the oldest men had to line up at the row of sinks formerly used by teenagers, and trundle down the cold stone floors and corridors to the lavatories. Yet, as District Treasurer from 1979-



1994, I never once heard them complain. I knew all along, however, that they needed and deserved better. When adequate retirement funds began to be available as we sold off part of the excess 400 acres at Ammendale and developed the Ammendale Business Campus, plans started for a new La Salle Hall. The District Chapter held in the summer of 1988 gave its approval for the construction of a new retirement house. Due to a series of time consuming and expensive setbacks dealing mostly with zoning issues, some of which had to be resolved in the Court of Special Appeals and the Legislature of the State of Maryland, construction didn't begin until the second half of 1992.

As frustrating as it was, the wait turned out to be somewhat of a blessing as it allowed us the time to go into an in-depth review of the planning details and architectural renderings to make certain that, unlike some other past building projects of the Brothers, we got it right. I believe we did, but as Paul Harvey would say that is the rest of the story and will have to await the next edition of Visions.
